GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. The Board of Directors reserves the right to postpone or extend the date of this Exposition; to make any changes in the premium list they may deem necessary for the best interest of the Exposition; to interpret all rules and regulations; and to add to these rules, and settle all questions and differences in regard thereto.

2. The Panhandle South Plains Fair Association reserves the right to pay printed premiums in ratio to net earnings. The Association hopes to pay all premiums in full this year; however, as premiums and all other expenses must be paid from gate and other receipts made from the operation of the Fair itself, this condition is made to put exhibitors on due and legal notice.

3. Any person violating the general or special rules as published in this premium list will forfeit all privileges and premiums won.

4. The Panhandle South Plains Fair Association, its officers, and its employees shall not in any way be held responsible for loss, damage or injury to articles, livestock or person, while same is on the Fairgrounds. The Fair Association will take all reasonable precautions to protect the property and exhibits of the concessionaires and exhibitors – but will not be liable for, or make payment for any article, animal or property lost, damaged or injured while on the Fairgrounds.

5. No claim or suit for injury to any person or property shall be asserted against the Panhandle South Plains Fair Association, its officers or agents, by any person, firm or corporation, or their agent, representatives, servants or employees having permits to exhibit or occupy space on the Fairgrounds.

6. Any exhibit, stand, show or concession falsely entered shall, at the option of the Manager, be removed from the Fairgrounds without any reason being assigned therefore and the refunding of any money paid for such space will be left to the discretion of the Board of Directors.

7. All entries shall be subject to the special rules of the department under which they are entered. In case of conflict between general and special rules, the latter shall govern.

8. All protests shall be passed on by the Board of Directors and must be made in writing to the Manager, accompanied by an affidavit setting forth the grounds for protesting, together with a deposit fee of fifty dollars which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Parties interested will be notified of the time and place for considering the protest and will be given an opportunity to submit evidence.

9. No person will be permitted to distribute advertising matter on the Fairgrounds, except from his or her place of business or exhibit space. The tacking of any advertisements, bills, or posters other than within the space occupied by the exhibitor is strictly forbidden. Civic, religious, and fraternal organizations are invited to rent booth space under the same rules that apply to all exhibitors. Begging, soliciting, singing, or public speaking is prohibited except from the exhibitors space rented expressly for that purpose.

SPECIAL RULES

1. This department is open to everyone and entries will be accepted on Friday, September 19 from 3 p.m. till 7 p.m. and on Saturday, September 20 from 8 a.m. till 11 a.m. Exhibits not delivered to the Superintendent by this time will be barred from competition. An entry card must be completely filled out by the exhibitor including an address.

2. **All crop entries become property of the Fair and will not be picked up. This will be a terminal show.**

3. **Each exhibitor is limited to one entry in each class and all entries must be grown in the South Plains area during the current crop year.**

4. In cases where there is only one exhibitor and no competition, the judge or judges shall only award premiums in accordance with the merits of the exhibit which may be first, second, third, etc.

5. In classes of numerous entries, exhibits not placing in the top three may be disposed of at the discretion of the Superintendent for reasons of space.

6. The decision as to the proper class for a particular exhibit is the responsibility of the exhibitor. The arrangement of all exhibits will be done by the Superintendent.

7. All cotton bolls must be naturally opened in the field.

8. **No chemically treated seed will be accepted.**

9. Samples which do not meet class specifications as listed (such as size, quantity, number, etc.) will not be accepted.

Division 1— South Plains Cotton

Premium money in Division 1 will be: 1st, \$15.00; 2nd, \$10.00; 3rd, \$5.00

Premium money in all other Divisions will be: 1st, \$6.00; 2nd, \$5.00; 3rd, \$4.00

Ribbons will be given through three places in all classes.

Cotton is the leading cash crop on the South Plains and the following classes are offered in recognition of and as a tribute to this outstanding plant. All entries must be of the type grown in the South Plains area and the variety of cotton must be indicated on each entry card. Leaves must be stripped from all stalks.

Class

100—Most Bolls Per Plant, a stalk with the greatest number of bolls. Bolls must be 1" in diameter or larger.

101—Best Commercially Adapted Stalk, a stalk with proper boll placement and adequate numbers that is judged as the best adapted for mechanical harvest.

102—Best 20 Opened Bolls

1. All entries and awards in this department shall be subject to the General Rules and Regulations as published in the front of this catalog.
2. Entries close in this Division on **Thursday, September 11, 2008**. Entry fee: \$10.00 per exhibit. Late entries will be accepted until **September 18th** for an additional \$5.00 per exhibit.
3. Exhibits will be accepted by the Superintendent from **3 p.m. to 6 p.m. on Friday, 9/19** and from **8:30 a.m. to 11 a.m. on Saturday, 9/20**. Late arrivals after 11 a.m. will not be accepted. All exhibits must remain in place until 10 p.m. on **Saturday 9/27** and should be removed by **12 noon on Sunday 9/28**.
4. Articles entered for exhibition must be the work of students enrolled (at the time of construction) in agriscience classes in high schools that are approved by TEA.
5. Projects determined to be "Arts and Crafts" are not eligible in this department and must be entered in other appropriate departments of the fair.
6. The exhibits must have been constructed during the **2007-2008** school term or the beginning of the **2008-2009** term.
7. Each school can be limited to three exhibits in each Division. Limitations will be at the discretion of the Superintendent.
8. Exhibitors will be assigned space inside the **Trade Mart Building**.
9. It will be the responsibility of the FFA Chapter to place signs on each of their exhibits showing: (1) Student(s) name; (2) FFA Chapter; and (3) Name of item. Signs for the inside exhibits should be on the approved FFA exhibit card. All signs will be covered during judging.
10. The Panhandle South Plains Fair Association will not be responsible for fire, theft, vandalism, or any destruction of property.
11. The Panhandle South Plains Fair Association reserves the right to refuse any exhibit.

Rosettes for Best of Show will be awarded in each department in divisions to be designated by the superintendent. These awards are given at the discretion of the judges for entries which illustrate outstanding merit.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. All entries in this department will be subject to the General Rules and Regulations as published in this catalog. **Please read.**

2. The superintendents of each department in charge of entries reserve the right to accept or reject entries, depending on the condition and the suitability for exhibit.

3. **NOTE ENTRY TIMES.** A schedule of entry times is listed under each department. **NO SHIPPED-IN EXHIBITS WILL BE ACCEPTED.**

4. **NO ENTRY FEES IN ANY DIVISION**

5. Any exhibit that has been awarded a premium in this Fair in any previous year is not eligible to re-enter that exhibit in the current year's Fair.

6. **No soiled articles will be accepted.**

7. **All exhibits must be the work of the exhibitor only and made within the last three years, except where otherwise noted in individual department rules.**

8. An exhibitor may enter only one article per class number.

9. Premiums shall be awarded in accordance with the merits of the article exhibited.

10. Judges and Fair Officials will not be permitted to enter exhibits in the divisions which they judge or work.

11. **Professional work will be accepted in the ceramic and dolls divisions of craft and hobbies and in the culinary department.** You are considered a Professional if you teach or have taught for a fee, lecture or have lectured for a fee, written books or articles for profit, sell for-profit products you have made, or sell services for a fee. At time of entry, exhibitor is to designate "Professional Division". **Ribbons will be awarded; premiums will not be awarded.**

12. **PICK UP ARTICLES:** Exhibitors must present their duplicate entry ticket to retrieve their articles between 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. on Monday, September 29. Any non-perishable exhibit not picked up by 6:00 p.m. will be available for pick-up at the Fair office beginning Wednesday, October 1st at 10:00 a.m. These items will be held in the Fair office for 60 days, after which time, they will be discarded. The Fair's office hours are Monday - Friday 8:30 a.m.-Noon & 1:00 p.m.-5:00 p.m. Perishable items will be discarded immediately.

13. No article entered for exhibit in any division of the Women's Department may be removed prior to 9 a.m. on Monday, September 29th without the specific consent of the Superintendent.

14. To the Extension Homemakers or Young Homemakers Club whose members win the greatest number of points on individual exhibits, the following prizes will be given: First — \$60.00; Second — \$40.00; Third — \$30.00. The points will be counted as follows: Blue ribbon — 3; Red ribbon — 2; White ribbon — 1.

15. To the Extension Homemakers or Young Homemakers Club members winning the greatest number of points, the following prizes will be given: First — \$15.00; Second — \$12.50; Third — \$10.00.

16. Contestants under Nos. 14 and 15 must be members of Extension Homemakers Clubs working under the supervision of an Extension Agent, or members of Young Homemakers Club of Texas working under the supervision of a Consultant of Home Making Education.

17. Entrants are encouraged to provide address labels to speed up the entry process.

GUIDELINE FOR JUDGES

1. Judges may not work as a volunteer to accept exhibits.
2. Judges are not to be informed of any exhibitor's name.
3. Judges will judge amateurs and professionals in separate divisions.
4. **A Judge may not have an exhibit as an amateur/professional in the Department in which they are judging. A judge may have an exhibit in a Department in which they are not working.**
5. If a judge believes that they recognize the work of an exhibitor, the judge is to evaluate impartially and fairly.
6. If a judge is given a soiled item, the judge should contact the superintendent/assistant superintendent to inquire about the condition of the item at time of entry, as no soiled items will be accepted.
7. Judges are to contact superintendent/assistant superintendent if exhibit appears to be in the wrong class. Superintendent will verify class written on entry ticket.
8. Judges are to evaluate each exhibit in each class on quality of workmanship, originality, use of color, etc.
9. Judges may award 1st, 2nd, 3rd, or Honorable Mention ribbons in each class. It is **not** required that ribbons be awarded if judges feel that entries do not merit award.
10. Rosettes for Best of Show are to be awarded in each department's division to be designated by the judges. These awards are to be given at the discretion of the judges for entries which illustrate outstanding merit.
11. Judges are not to discuss the exhibit with assisting volunteer workers.
12. A judge may disqualify themselves for any reason.

GENERAL INFORMATION

1. This show is organized by the Lubbock Council of Garden Clubs as a Standard Flower Show. No money prizes will be given to individual exhibitors, only first, second, third place ribbons, honorable mention ribbons, and local awards.

2. This show is open to **all amateurs** wishing to exhibit both in horticulture and design. They need not be garden club members and everyone is invited to enter. Entries from 4-H and FHA members are welcomed and points will be given through the Youth Department. (These youth should put this information on entry card).

3. Container grown plants, arboreal specimens, miscellaneous ornamentals, and dried designs **only** will be accepted at the Flower Building between 3:30 and 5:30 p.m., Thursday September 18th. Due to building space, container grown plants and pots excluding hanging baskets **should not** exceed 28" in diameter. All containers should be marked on the bottom with name and phone number. For additional information on container plants, please call Mary Basinger at 806-996-5362.

4 **All** types of entries (including above) will be accepted between 8:00 and 11:00 a.m., Saturday, September 20th at the Flower Building.

5. Entries and ribbons may be claimed and removed between 1:00 and 3:00 p.m., on Sunday, September 28th If not claimed on Sunday, they must be removed between 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. on Monday, September 29th. No entry shall be removed from the exhibit area before this time. The Committee will not be responsible for any unclaimed exhibits or ribbons.

All exhibits will be carefully guarded while the show is open, but the Committee and Fair Association will not be responsible for loss or damage to exhibits or to personal property of exhibitors.

Exhibitors are strongly encouraged to come to the Flower Building at least once during the Show to replace your exhibit with fresh materials.

6. Following is an **abbreviated** schedule of classes. Copies of the complete schedule will be available at the Panhandle South Plains Fair Office, 1012 Ave. A or the Garden and Arts Center, 4215 University. Exhibitors are urged to have a complete schedule to avoid misunderstandings and disappointments and for a complete listing of rules.

SHOW THEME:

"DECADES OF DESIGN"

HORTICULTURE — DIVISION 130

1 All entries in Horticulture Division (with exception of container-grown plants) **MUST BE GROWN OUTSIDE BY THE EXHIBITOR AND ONLY ONE ENTRY IN EACH CLASS OR SUBDIVISION WILL BE ALLOWED.** Container grown plants must have been container grown by exhibitor for at least three (3) months. Exceptions: Multiple plantings such as terrariums or hanging planters, must have been grown together for at least six (6) weeks.

2. Pre-entry tags may be picked up at Panhandle South Plains Fair Office, 1012 Ave. A or the Garden and Arts Center, 4215 University.

3. Class numbers for horticulture classes below are in full schedule; or, if you bring your specimens on Saturday morning between 8:00 and 11:00 a.m., workers will assist you.

Section 1. Bulbs, Corms, Tubers, and Rhizomes. Dahlias (named cultivars—varieties), Cannas, Fall Iris, etc. Single specimens and collections. Foliage and stems in proportion to bloom size.

Section 2. Petunias. Specimens and collections, divided by type and color.

Flower Show Cont'd

- Section 3. Marigolds.** Specimens and collections of large varieties. French and other dwarf varieties require one stem with a minimum of three blooms.
- Section 4. Dianthus.** Carnation (1 specimen bloom); Sweet William and Pinks (one specimen stem).
- Section 5. Zinnias.** Specimens and collections for large varieties. One specimen stem of dwarf varieties.
- Section 6. Miscellaneous Annuals and Tender Perennials.** Specimens and collections of Cockscomb, Princess Feather, Geraniums, etc.
- Section 7. Hardy Perennials.** Such as Asters, Phlox, Daisies.
- Section 8. Ornamental Foliage Plants.** One specimen stem of Dusty Miller, Coleus, Joseph's Coat, etc.
- Section 9. Dendranthema.** (Chrysanthemums). Named cultivars (varieties). Cushion, Garden Varieties, Sprays, Disbuds and any other type.
- Section 10. Garden Grown Herbs.** Medicinal or culinary. One specimen stem in good proportion to growth pattern of plant.
- Section 11. Container Grown Houseplants.** Cacti and Succulents; Foliage, Flowering and Fruited Plants, African Violets, Terrariums and Dish Gardens, etc.
- Section 12. Vines.** Blooming, Foliage and/or Fruited. Length of specimen in good proportion to growth pattern of plant.
- Section 13. Berried, Flowering or Fruited Shrubs or Trees.** Not less than 12" nor more than 30" in length.
- Section 14. Foliage Branches from Shrub or Tree.** Not less than 12" nor more than 30" in length.
- Section 15. Miscellaneous Ornamental Plants.** Such as Pampas Grass, Fountain Grass, Bamboo, Umbrella Palm, etc.
- Section 16. Roses.** Any kind: Hybrid Teas, Grandi-floras, Floribundas, etc.
- Section 17. Fruits and Vegetables.** Grown in home garden or flower bed. To be exhibited on 7" or 9" paper plate. Number of specimens should be in proportion to size of plate. Large - one specimen, Medium - three each and Small - twelve each. See schedule.

DESIGN — DIVISION 131

Accessories permitted in all classes. Contrived forms permitted in all classes providing they conform to class requirements, i.e. fresh, dried, etc. No features allowed. Classes will be subdivided according to ability of designer, designated as **Advanced (A)** or **Novice/Intermediate (N/I)** on entry tag. **No artificial flowers, fruit, or foliage.**

Section I. Exhibitors may enter one design in each class if desired. Plant materials and other components must conform to the stated class requirements.

Class 1. 1990's - "NATURE'S PALLETTE" - Exhibitor's choice of EITHER all FRESH or a COMBINATION of fresh and dried/treated plants material.

Class 2. 1980's'- "THAT'S ENTERTAINMENT" - All DRIED and/or TREATED plant material.

Class 3. 1970's - "THE MANY MOODS OF MUSIC" - Exhibitor's choice of EITHER all FRESH or a COMBINATION of fresh and dried/treated plant material.

Class 4. 1960's - "SOUTH PLAINS GLAMOUR" EXHIBITOR'S CHOICE of plant material and components.

Class 5. 1950's - "COME OUT OF THE KITCHEN" EXHIBITOR'S CHOICE of plant material and components.

Class 6. 1940's - "MEMORIES" All DRIED and/or TREATED plant material.

(A Card of explanation would be helpful to the public.)

Section II. Miniature Designs—No more than 5" in height, width, or depth. Plant materials/components must be SMALL as SCALE is important (plant materials to each other, and to the container).

Class 7. "A BIRD'S EYE VIEW" All DRIED and/or TREATED plant material.

Class 8. "IT'S THE LITTLE THINGS THAT COUNT" COMBINATION of FRESH and DRIED/TREATED plant material.

 - *All work must be matted with or mounted on white mat/poster board. (No Frames, and *No simple construction paper backing*)
 - *All work must be original.
 - *All work must be 2-dimensional, or mountable upon the display panels. (*Reliefs*)
 - *Entries must be identified with an official fair tag attached to the lower right hand corner of the art **and** to the back of the artwork. (Official entry tags are available from the Fair Office, 1012 Ave. A or the event coordinator.)
 - *Artwork created after March 15, 2008 will be entered in the student's current grade level. Grades with more than 25 entries will receive two sets of awards by entry volume.
